Blue Ridge Community and Technical College

Student Co-Chair Rachel King presented about what First2 Network is doing to support first-generation students in the Appalachian region at the Appalachian Studies Association Conference (with UC student Jenny Bunner and Marshall Student Nicole Liang); she said about that experience, and she was accepted into the Greenbank Observatory Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU). Scholar Maya Dixon-Gross recently obtained a teaching assistant (TA) position in a biology course at WVU, scholar Angelina Duriez got accepted into the WVU Cancer Institute summer internship, and scholars Sydney Kudlack and Stephanie Sarfo participated in the First2 Legislative Ambassadors trip that was held in February. Michelle Richards-Babb, with help from a chemistry graduate student, set up a table at the Buckhannon Upshur Middle School Career Fair on March 7th providing information about attending college and majoring in chemistry. Michelle Richards-Babb also administered the Chemistry Merit Badge with assistance from a past First2 student during WVU's Merit Badge University on Feb 24th. Michelle Paden and Michelle Richards-Babb attended the First2 Higher Education Administrator workshop on Feb 23rd. Oluwatobi (Tobi) Odeleye has committed to joining the First2 Network, welcome Tobi!

West Virginia University Institute of Technology

Some of WVU Tech's campus club members will be going to Washington D.C. for a TRIO SSS Graduate School & Cultural Enrichment spring break trip. They are working towards finishing out their PDSAs for the year. They are planning an end of the year celebration, sponsored by the Dean of the College of Engineering and Computer Sciences and open to their entire campus, to celebrate their graduates.



First2 Higher Education Administrator Conference

On February 23rd, 2024, First2 Network held a Higher Education Administrator workshop in the WV Higher Education Policy Commission's David Hendrickson Conference Room of the WV Regional Technology Park in Charleston, WV. The workshop activities explored how administrative efforts in higher education can help change systems to better support the success of rural, first generation and other underrepresented STEM students. 23 people attended the workshop including 15 representatives (faculty, department chairs, deans, and/or provosts) from 8 higher education institutions, six First2 staff members and/or PIs, a member of our Industry Advisory Board and a member of our External Advisory Council.

Taking the opportunity to use HEPC's new conference space at the WV Regional Technology Park (and receiving a warm welcome from STaR Assistant Director Janet Rorrer), this group came together to explore together how strategically targeted administrative efforts can help change systems to better support the success of rural, first generation and other underrepresented STEM students. Working together, Institutional Administrators, Faculty Liaisons, and First2 staff focused on key issues of effort and investment that every member of the team carries.

One of the most prominent issues that has surfaced again and again over the years has been team incentives. This can affect initially involving participants but also in continued involvement, particularly as financial compensation is not going to be a primary motivation. Members workshopped alternative but equally important means of compensation, which included but were not limited to merit for post-tenure, placement in faculty PAF as service and/or scholarship, time release incentives, and shifts in departmental funding toward retention. It was clear at all levels of the institution there was care and concern for faculty and staff work.

Another key issue revolved around student credit requirements - specifically in the way they affect student scholarships, full-time enrollment, and re-entry into programs. Many groups discussed support systems such as parachute courses, alternate term courses, and substitute courses from student success centers. The teams recognized issues of course transferability and low course sizes. They also recognized the limitations of alternative term courses and the extra financial costs.

The workshop was a positive and productive event focused on creating ways for students, faculty, and institutions to work together and work effectively. The workshop helped develop ideas for how to create communication channels not just within an institution (including students, faculty, deans, student success, etc.) but also across institutions.

Student Spotlight: Zorayah Jackson



Zorayah Jackson is a First2 Student Director and second year student at Blue Ridge Community and Technical College (BRCTC) studying software development engineering. The summer before starting at BRCTC, she attended the 2-week summer internship program being offered there through First2 Network. During that experience First2 Student Coordinator Samantha Mitchell spoke to them more about what the First2 Network was.

Zorayah spoke about how, "at that time, I still wasn't a hundred percent sure what it was, but I knew that it was for first generation students and they were helping them to stay in STEM...I thought it was a great opportunity and a great experience because that [internship] helped me get to know all the professors. Half of the day was for the internship and then the other half was different guest professors talking about the classes they teach, so we got to meet all of the professors that we would end up having throughout our courses."


When asked what she gained most from that internship, she talked about how getting to know her advisor was particularly helpful. "Any questions I had, I was really comfortable being able to ask." She also spoke about how getting to know her STEM peers was an important part of that experience. "I felt like I had a lot of support because I knew everyone; I was comfortable enough to reach out through an email. I also had people that were taking the same classes, so I was okay asking them for help."

We talked about the First2 program at BRCTC and she noted that BRCTC's First2 campus club offers multiple meeting times, including meetings over Zoom and an evening time, so that student commuters have more options to attend. We discussed what feels important to her about being a First2 Student Director there and Zorayah said, "I wanted to be a director so that I could help mentor people...after the summer [internship] we had two mentors and I just felt like that was such a great thing to have. I wanted to be somebody that someone could look up to or someone that could help be a tutor for STEM classes; I felt like if [students] know what they're doing they'll be more likely to stay."

She says her favorite experience being a First2 Student Director has been, "planning out PDSAs...I like thinking about how it is going to have an effect... thinking about the impact

that it could have." We also discussed the peer-to-peer mentoring the First2 student directors have been doing and how she thinks that this is a valuable initiative for the network to continue. She said, "I feel like it helps, especially with first generation students, if you have somebody to talk to about college. Someone who's been in college for a little bit longer than you, they'll be able to help you and [offer] tips...especially because they're part of the network and in the same or related major, they have most of the same experiences that you have, so seeing how they manage their time, how their transition from high school to college was, how they grew relationships with their professors, how they've been able to better fit in on campus...I feel like it's important to have somebody to talk to who has gone through the same experiences as you."

On the Road with First2: Legislative Ambassadors at the WV State Capitol

On February 22nd, 2024 our First2 Legislative Ambassadors visited the West Virginia Capitol to learn more about the Capitol building and the legislative process as well as to engage with state representatives about legislative decisions that may affect the retention and persistence of STEM students. First2 Student Directors and Scholars also wrote letters to their state representatives to complement their visit and these engagement efforts.


While at the Capitol, they shared information about the First2 program with various organizations, senators and house representatives. Some First2 students chose to speak

with their representatives about HB 4919, a bill that would permit a college student to reapply for the Promise Scholarship on an annual basis if that student falls out of eligibility during the academic year. We believe their engagement with legislators to discuss this bill and the benefits it could have for college students pursuing STEM degrees (academically rigorous disciplines like science and engineering are difficult for all students, but first-generation and other underrepresented students encounter even more obstacles) was truly meaningful, and since our visit this bill was passed by both legislative bodies and approved by the Governor.

We are incredibly proud of our First2 students for speaking with their representatives about issues that could have a profound impact on the systems change work that feels important to them and that will positively affect STEM student success for years to come.

Solar Eclipse Viewing Party April 8, 1:30 - 4 p.m. WVU Planetarium


